NATIONAL PHYSICIAN SUICIDE AWARENESS DAY

THE CORD RESILIENCE COMMITTEE

INTRODUCED the first-ever National Physician Suicide Awareness Day on September 17, 2018. Evolved from the need to honor colleagues, friends, family lost to suicide, NPSA Day was born to be recognized annually on September 17.

Physician suicide is a tremendous issue in healthcare today. While estimates of the actual number of physician suicides vary, literature has shown that the relative risk for suicide being 2.27 times greater among women and 1.41 times higher among men versus the general population.

In honor of the day, NPSA lapel pins were sold to raise awareness and funds for CORD Cares and American Association of Suicidology.

CORD ANNUAL REPORT—2018




THE CORD CARES FOUNDATION BEGAN in the aftermath of Hurricane Harvey in August 2017. The CORD membership came to leadership with questions of how to help their brothers and sisters who were affected by this storm and the subsequent storms that followed. CORD immediately released \$10,000 to assist any individual or program who needed support. In the days and weeks after, the Foundation raised an additional \$15,000 to support the cause.

The CORD Cares Foundation supports more than natural disaster events. In October 2017, the CORD Cares Foundation provided the University of Las Vegas School of Medicine a grant to bring in qualified support after the horror of the Las Vegas shootings.

CORD/EMF MEDICAL EDUCATION RESEARCH GRANT



EACH YEAR, CORD PARTNERS WITH the Emergency Medicine Foundation (EMF) to provide two grant opportunities: The Education Scholarship/Starter Grant with a maximum grant of \$10,000 and the Research Grant with a maximum grant of \$25,000.

In 2018, Mira Mamtani, MD, MSEd was awarded an EMF/CORD Emergency Medicine Education Research Grant for \$25,000. She will work on her project titled "The Gender Gap: A multi-site, mixed method study exploring gender differences in feedback to EM trainees" at the University of Pennsylvania, below is a synopsis of her current findings. Mira Mamtani MD, MSEd and Kevin Scott MD, MSEd are excited to collaborate with a team of brilliant medical educators and researchers from University of Pennsylvania, Oregon Health and Sciences University, University of Alabama-Birmingham, University of Iowa, University of Washington and the Association of American Medical Colleges (AAMC) to explore disparity in the assessment of emergency medicine (EM) residents, specifically focusing on gender and potential bias in the evaluation process.

With support from a grant funded by CORD and the EMF we aim to (1) assess gender differences in written feedback of EM residents through qualitative analysis of clinical evaluation comments across five study sites over three years, totaling approximately 21,000 comments, and to (2) determine how gender concordance or discordance between the evaluator and trainee affects feedback. Our preliminary analysis, inclusive of one year of comments from all five study sites, revealed two major themes: (1) female faculty were more likely to give personality trait feedback to female residents, and (2) male residents were more


likely to receive feedback related to management style and clinical practice compared to female residents.

The study team, including Lalena Yarris MD, MCR, Lauren Walter MD, Michael Takacs MD, Fiona Gallahue MD, Lauren Conlon MD, Dana Kaminstein PhD, Jaya Aysola MD, MPH, Constance Filling PhD, and Stephanie Abbuhl MD, are excited to better understand the content and context of gender based differences in feedback to EM trainees, and inform the future design of interventions to address this evaluation inequity.




CORD LAUNCHES New AMS and CMS Systems
