Definition:

"A professional development portfolio is a collection of materials, made by a professional that records, and reflects on, key events and processes in that professional's career." Hall 1992

Purposes of a portfolio:

- Record and display professional goals, growth and achievement
- Collection of materials that demonstrate a resident's competency
- Exhibit of work that supports a resident's self-marketing upon graduation
- Foundation for career-long documentation of professional growth

Real purpose of a portfolio:

- Get the best academic job
- Get the best academic title
- Get promoted
- Guide your career development

Key Components of a Portfolio:

- Experience What happened? What has been done, seen, written...
- Learning Discovery that what has been recalled has significance for doing or changing things in the future
- Evidence Demonstration of how learning is being applied in context
- Learning Needs & Opportunities Identify where to go next and develop and individualized educational action plan

Different from a CV:

- Evidence of instructional activities with evaluations
 - Bedside teaching
 - Didactic teaching
 - Simulation/Procedural/Small group teaching
- Describe curricular innovation and with evidence of scholarship
 - New courses or sessions
 - Novel learning modules
- Identify mentorship
 - o Discuss students or others you have helped
- Articulate your teaching philosophy & goals
 - Reflective statement

Reflective statement

- Teaching philosophy
 - Personal learning theory
 - Role as a teacher
 - Educational strengths
 - Areas of question that you wish to explore further
- Teaching goals
 - Focused goals 3-5 years
 - Might include career path, but shouldn't be just what job you want
- Experience & expertise in teaching
 - What worked how did learners improve based on your teaching
 - What didn't work how did you/will you change a teaching program or style next time if something didn't work well.
