

Key Coaching Principles¹ To Include in your Program:

- 1. The Coaching Spirit: believe in you and your learners
- 2. Seek Accountability and Accomplishments
- 3. Build Relationships and Trust
- 4. Set Goals and Action Plans
- 5. Offer Suggestions and Simplifications
- 6. Embrace a Feedback Culture
- 7. Listening and Intuition: be present, don't judge
- 8. Ask Questions to get answers, and encourage Curiosity to ignite the spirit
