GOOD SAMARITAN LAWS INSTRUCTOR'S GUIDE

BACKGROUND:

Good Samaritan laws are not often taught in residency, yet they are an important subject matter relevant to all physicians.

PURPOSE & GOALS:

To provide a general overview of Good Samaritan laws, portray realistic scenarios with associated questions to prompt discussion, describe real-life cases relevant to Good Samaritan laws and their outcomes, discuss state variability in legal obligation and protection, and provide facts about in-flight emergencies.

EDUCATIONAL OBJECTIVES:

By the end of this didactic, the learner will be able to:

- Describe the goals of Good Samaritan Laws
- Define the criteria that must be met for Good Samaritan Laws to be applicable
- Recognize how location is relevant to the utilization of Good Samaritan Laws
- Identify when physicians are legally obligated to help
- Discuss the obligations and protections in place for in-flight emergencies

Recommended implementation/timeline

- Pre-module
 - Prior to attending the didactic, the pre-reading should be provided to the learners, which will allow for them to focus on more advanced topics and raise informed questions throughout the session.
- During the module
 - Pretest: The learners will begin with a pre-test (embedded within the powerpoint slides) designed to test their basic knowledge about Good Samaritan Laws. (10 minutes)
 - o **Good Samaritan Laws** Didactic presented by a senior resident or faculty member. (40 minutes)
 - Post-test: The learners will then end with a post-test (embedded within the powerpoint slides) to evaluate their comprehension of the material about Good Samaritan Laws. (10 minutes)

CONCLUSIONS:

Good Samaritan emergency care is part of the ABEM Model of Clinical Practice, which is designed for use as the core document for our specialty, and a foundation for developing residency curricula. This module was developed to train medical student and residents in the basics concepts of good Samaritan emergency care, with a focus on its legal components. After completion of this curricular module, learners will better understand the definition, goals and application of Good Samaritan laws to help inform their own practice and how they might respond to out-of-hospital medical emergencies.
